ORGAN REPERTOIRE: RICHARD FREY

Dick Frey plans on presenting a wide variety of organ music that would be useful for Preludes, Offertories and Postludes. This includes music for the different seasons of the Liturgical Year and music for general usage. The music ranges from easy to moderately difficult, and he promises that nothing will require months and months of practice!

Dick is Harrisburg AGO's new Program Chairman. He has served as Minister of Music at Trinity United Church of Christ in Hanover since 2003. Previously, he was Minister of Music at the Ridgewood, NJ, United Methodist Church for 31 years. He is a Past-Dean of the Northern New Jersey Chapter of the AGO. He is a graduate of Westminster Choir College and holds Master's Degrees from Boston University and Palmer Theological Seminary, Philadelphia.

ORGAN WITH INSTRUMENTS: SUZANNE KLINEDINST

HANDBELLS: SHAWN GINGRICH

Shawn plans a session on handbells focusing on using the instrument creatively in worship, reading some pieces that directors could consider, and giving an introduction to handbells for those who are new to the art.

Shawn has directed handbell choirs for 15 years and has been a ringing member of the world-renowned Westminster Choir College Concert Handbell Choir. He is an avid solo ringer. In addition to his church work at First United Methodist Church in Hershey, he also founded and directs the Hershey Handbell Ensemble, an auditioned community group, and he directs the Messiah College Concert Handbell Choir. He is a graduate of Lebanon Valley College with a B.S. in Music Education and a B.M. in Sacred Music. He also has a M.M. in Sacred Music from Westminster Choir College.

Kyiv Symphony Orchestra and Chorus Concert

On Monday evening, Oct. 30, 2006, at 7:30 p.m., the 160-member Kyiv Symphony Orchestra and Chorus from Kiev, Ukraine will perform at Trinity Lutheran Church, 2000 Chestnut St., Camp Hill. On its seventh tour of the United States, this concert will be their last stop before they return home.

The group began in 1992 when American choral conductor Dr. Roger McMurrin and his wife, Diane, were invited by an Episcopal priest to come to Kiev to perform Handel's *Messiah*, a work which had been prohibited by the Soviets for seventy years. Dr. McMurrin hired 35 Ukrainian professional singers and a local orchestra to premier this work, and the concert hall was overflowing with people at the performance. This experience led Dr. and Mrs. McMurrin to leave America to continue their work in the Ukraine.

The Kyiv Symphony Orchestra and Chorus has premiered over 53 Christian classics, many of which have been aired on radio and television across Ukraine. The KSOC has given the Ukrainian people the chance to hear great choral masterpieces for the first time—particularly those based on religious themes—which in Soviet days were banned.

The concert is free and open to the public, but an offering will be taken to help the group cover expenses. Questions can be answered by calling the church office at 737-8635..

"Woodworks" and "An American Organ Mass"

A Christmas Special in October by Chuck Yocum

Let's prepare for Christmas by looking at ***WOODWORKS for Christmas*** published by The Sacred Music Press (KK 454). Dale Wood was one of the very fine arrangers of hymns and carols for organ before his untimely death. This volume has seven arrangements that are quite appropriate to learn and use for church services. The first one is "*Shepherd's Pipe Carol*", an original, I believe, by Dale Wood. It is four pages in length, changing from the Key of D to the Key of G and back. It begins with Choir Flute 8' and no Pedal for the first eight measures, adding soft Pedal and Great Flutes 8' & 2' as a solo for the next eight measures, then back to the Choir for eight measures and the first key change. You may want to use the Swell 8' Flute in place of the Choir Flute because Wood does not use the Swell otherwise in this piece. It alternates between the two ideas of Solo & 8' Flute. The selection takes approximately two minutes to play.

The second voluntary is titled "*Austrian Shepherd's Carol*" (**Es bluh'n Maie'n**), a folk melody. This is another four-pager registered for Choir, Swell and Pedal. This can be adapted to your two-manual instrument, changing the Swell to the Great and the Choir to the Swell. A written reminder will keep you from being confused. This piece also alternates between using soft registration on one manual and using a solo 8' on the other. It involves limited pedaling, begins *pp* and ends *ppp*.

A lovely addition to your repertoire, "*Sussex Carol*", is the third selection, a traditional English Carol we have heard many times. This four-page voluntary begins with Flutes 8' & 2' in a sprightly manner, and uses a light 8' Reed on the other manual. It is in the Key of C for three pages and then changes to the Key of A. On the last page you will need a full organ sound for the rousing ending.

The next carol uses the English folk tune "*Forest Green*", sometimes used for "*O Little Town of Bethlehem*." What a lovely three-page piece, taking but two minutes to play. It uses practically the same registration as the second voluntary.

"*In Dulci Jubilo*" is based on a 14th century German carol and takes 2½ minutes to play, covering five pages. It is registered for three manuals; however, you can do it on two. On page four, it uses Full Organ for about 18 measures, ending with Flutes 8' & 2' and finally the 8' Flute and soft Pedal.

"*Carol of the Manger*" (**Away in a Manger**), is a tune by W. J. Kirkpatrick. This 2½-minute gem is four pages in length and may become one of your favorites. It uses light registration throughout, and has light pedaling.

"*Christmas is Here*", based on a French carol, is four pages in length and takes about four minutes to play. It is my personal favorite in the collection. I have used this many, many times and plan to use it until the book wears out. It begins with Swell strings and soft Pedal, and then adds a Solo 8' stop on the Great -- a Flute would do the trick. If you have a two-manual instrument, in place of the Choir

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Flute Celeste, use the Swell String or Great Dulciana.

Please take a look at *WOODWORKS for Christmas*. It will be your loss if you let this one escape your repertoire of Christmas music.

AN AMERICAN ORGAN MASS by Richard Purvis is still available from Harold Flammer, Inc. (2074). It was originally \$2.50 in 1953 and is still a bargain at \$20.00 in 2006. This must be ordered in advance because it is a *print-on-demand* collection.

The first of the seven selections is "**Prelude Solennel**" (**Veni Emmanuel**) and is five pages in length. It begins with the melody in the Pedal on 16' & 8' stops. The Great 8' & 4' is added eight measures later. The Pedal once again resumes the melody with the Swell coupled, and the Great adds the Swell a few measures later. After a rather full sound, the Swell reeds are taken off and the next section begins with Swell strings and the melody in the Pedal on a Clarinet stop, coupled from the manuals. The last measure uses a soft 16' alone, with the reed uncoupled.

The second selection is "**Introit**" (**Christe Redemptor Omnium**) and is also five pages in length. The registration is as follows: Great--Flutes 8' & 4' with Swell to Great; Swell--Principals 8', 4' & 2'; Choir--Gemshorn 8' & Flute 4; and Pedal--Solo stop 8'. This can be done on a two-manual instrument.

Third in the Mass is "**Offertory**" (**Resonet in Laudibus**) that uses a Reed 8' on the Swell, Gemshorn 8' on the Great, Flutes 4' on the Choir and Pedal 8' Flute. One of my favorites, it has a lovely lilting 6/8 rhythm, is to be played like a cradle song, is three pages in length, and can be done on a two-manual instrument.

"**Interlude**" (**Corner**) is the fourth piece and is three pages in length. It is registered with light stops and soft pedal to balance, and can be done on a two-manual instrument.

Number five, "**Elevation**" (**Vom Himmel Hoch**), is three pages long. The solo is a 4' stop in the Pedal, with light stops on the manuals and is lovely with some triplet chords that are so 'Purvis' sounding.

Number six, "**Communion**" (**Gevaert**) is registered for two manuals and Pedal. Swell is soft 8' & 4'. The Great or Choir is Quintaton 8', and the Pedal is the Solo with an 8' stop.

The last, and not least, is "**Carillon**" (**Puer Nobis Nascitur**), and it is four pages in length. This one takes some work, but is well worth the time, because it uses a big Tuba or *Trompette en Chamade* sound on the third page. The piece goes from the Key of D to a nine-measure section on the second page, to five sharps (double pedaling here), and then back to the original key for two more pages. It ends with double pedaling in the last two measures. This is a wonderful postlude that I have used on Christmas Eve frequently. If you enjoy playing any of the other Purvis Advent and Christmas compositions, do yourself a favor and buy this as a Christmas gift to yourself. You will not regret it.

Mystery Chapter Member

Who among us worked for the Thornburg administration in the Pennsylvania Management Intern Program and then as a personnel analyst for several years before going to PennDOT as a program manager in the Office of Planning and Research? Can't guess? Then, hang onto your hats...SHE wrote and administered research contracts for asphalt, concrete and bridge construction and probably still remembers more about these subjects than anyone except an engineer really needs to know!

Since most church musicians tend to have "dual" careers, our mystery member-of-the-month may hold the record in that category. She began at Westminster College, New Wilmington, PA, as a French major, determined that music would be her avocation, despite having quite a musical background in central Montgomery County. Her grandfather played the tuba and served as president of the Norristown local of the American Federation of Musicians for more than thirty years. Her dad played the trumpet in dance bands and community bands in the Philadelphia area and eventually directed the Norristown Band...all the time working for the Reading Railroad—often bringing home more money from music than his full-time railroad work; however, our mystery member is the only family member who pursued music as a full-time professional....eventually. She couldn't stay out of the conservatory at college. When Westminster needed an accompanist for *HMS Pinafore*, she was coerced to help out. Soon after, she switched to music (voice) and became a teacher.

Following graduation, she taught junior high music for three years in Kenmore, NY, instructing general music classes and directing 7th and 8th grade choruses. During this time, she sang with the church choir at Holy Trinity Lutheran, Buffalo, under John Becker's direction and worked during the summers as a "Kelly Girl", primarily in law offices...leading to becoming a legal and contract administrator in later careers.

Her inspiration in vocal music she attributes to singing in Westminster's Concert Choir under the direction of Dr. Clarence Martin. His breathing and pronunciation techniques were superb. Also, having Ray Ocock as the school's organ teacher and accompanist helped her become a better accompanist.

Regarding herself as a singer and a choir director who happens to play the organ and piano, she began to sing at age four in the Cherub Choir at St. John's Lutheran Church, Centre Square, reminding us that a good musical experience when young encourages continued musicianship later. She sang her first solo at age five in Frog Hollow School's "Hansel and Gretel," singing the "Prayer." Formal voice training began at age 13 with Dr. John Duddy in Norris-

town. Dr. Duddy concentrated on a classical repertoire...a good grounding for college, and his church choirs sang major works...also excellent experience.

Back to careers! After three years in NY, she taught senior high school vocal music in Norristown for five years, directing all vocal groups, and teaching private voice and piano. She returned to St. John's Lutheran, a little older than a Cherub Choir member now, to sing in its adult choir, and occasionally directing it. She notes that, since her father sang tenor in this choir, it was the ONLY time in her life that she could get away with telling her Pennsylvania Dutch father how to behave!

She left public school teaching after eight years and began a full-time career in the legal field, continuing with her private voice and piano students. Remember Gino's fast-food chain? She was Legal Administrator for Gino's writing contracts and handling real estate settlements. By the time she finished her MBA from LaSalle University in Philadelphia, Gino's was out of business. So she came to Harrisburg.

So how did she wind up as an organist? She believes that it was a "genetic requirement" that she play the organ. Our mystery member says she always "played at" the organ whenever she could, but her first love was really singing. She didn't study the organ with any intensity until she came to Harrisburg; however, she had considerable experience with a pipe organ before she arrived.

While she was still at St. John's, Centre Square, it was decided to rebuild the organ using a crew of church volunteers. This was not totally crazy, since organ builder Brant Duddy (John's son) was a church member. The organ at that time was a wheezy, rheumy 1927 Mudler-Hunter. Under Brant's guidance, they began adding an antiphonal division and replacing the console. Our mystery member was the only "girl" to show up to work on the job. In the early 1970's, this was unheard of! "Girls" did not know how to handle hammers or screwdrivers. But she took to it like the proverbial duck to water. Several years later, she found out that she is a direct descendent of the Krauss family—Schwenkfelder organ builders working in the late 1700's and throughout the 1800's in southeastern Pennsylvania. A few Krauss organs still exist, the closest being in the Franklin County Historical Society in Chambersburg. Yes, the rebuilt organ worked...despite having a "girl" work on it!

In Harrisburg she joined the Lakeside Lutheran Church choir when Robert Lau was its director, followed by Helen Anthony, and Rick Fritsch. Rick told her of an opening for an organist/director in Strasburg, so, while

Professional Concerns Workshop

Harrisburg AGO's September program featured Jim Owen, AGO National Councillor for Professional Development, who guided program participants through an extensive presentation on contracts, job interviews, grievance procedures, the AGO mentoring program, and the thorny subject of copyright law. He brought to this program extensive experience from his personal and professional life, having a strong background in music ministry and the law. Jim infused these heavy issues with insight and humor.

Jim prepared a handout thoroughly outlining many of the issues surrounding church musicians' professional lives. Particularly strong was his advice regarding copyright law. Essentially, his message was—**when in doubt—don't**. He advised contacting the publisher whenever there was a question of copyright infringement. In addition his mock "job interview" brought to light some of the more "interesting" questions church musicians can encounter when applying for a position.
